#### **Executive Summary**

#### District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

**Vision:** To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

#### School Collection Development Plan

Sunblaze ES serves 1180 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 53% Hispanic and 47% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 73% White, 12% Black, 0% Native, 8% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 7% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Glenna Wyatt and Assistant Principals Dr. Tara Wilson and Tanner Jesso. Sunblaze ES is proud to offer many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books, Math Olympics, Math Club, Recycling Club as well as including Dance as one of our Special Areas.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Sunblaze ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2012 and the number of books per student is 10. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Sunblaze ES does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Students improved improved on state achievement tests
- More books should be purchased to support our English Language Learners
- Our lowest 25% students should have ample access to books on their level from the STAR literacy assessment
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines
- Increasing the collection to include student interests/requests of titles from students that others would enjoy

- Many of our students read in the native language as well as emerging second language readers. This is a need in our collection
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic students and Hispanic heritage
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project as well as aged titles in fiction and/or nonfiction

#### Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from <a href="https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml">https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml</a>) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

### **Collection Analysis**

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.
