I want to thank all of you who participated to make our Arctic Book Fair *SNOW* much fun! It was great to see so many familiar faces, as well as many new ones, shopping during the Sun Blaze Open House. I would like to thank our amazing book fair chair, Illene Marmelojo, who made sure everything ran smooth. I also would like to thank the many volunteers that helped out, Sun Blaze is so lucky to have you!

I've always said I have the best job at Sun Blaze. I get to watch your children grow into amazing readers and help to support them on that journey. I love when they come to visit me and they leave with the perfect book.

Here are just a few Media Center reminders:

- The library is open most mornings before school from 8:15am—8:35am
- Students can take an AR test most mornings in Computer Lab B (across from the Clinic)
- Students in grades 2-5 may check out 2 books from the Media Center
- Students in Kindergarten and first-grade may check out 1 book from the Media Center
- Students may keep their books for 2 weeks. After 2 weeks, the book is overdue
- Lost/Damaged books must be paid for through School Pay only, we cannot accept cash or checks.
- If a student has an overdue book, they cannot check out a book until the overdue book is returned or paid for.

Sun Blaze will participate in Battle of the Books in April. Information will be sent home with students in grades 3-5 soon. Students that are interested in trying out for our team will be given a test with questions that are similar to those asked during the competition. These questions will cover information from all 15 Sunshine State books. The top 6 scores on the assessment will make up the Sun Blaze team. Physical Education - Mr. Gagliardi & Mr. Nieves

This month the primary students will continue to work on their throwing and catching skills in addition to reviewing body and spatial awareness. After completion of this unit, we will begin the unit on tag games and striking activities. The Intermediate students will continue working on cooperative/teamwork activities and games that require developing offensive and defensive strategies.

This month Sun Blaze students are building upon the locomotor/movement skills they learned previously and will be working on cooperative activities that require them to work together as a team. The Intermediate students will continue working on cooperative/



teamwork activities and games that require developing offensive and defensive strategies. Lastly, the special area classes (PE, Movement, Art, Music) have introduced a monthly character trait. During October, we will focus on the principle of cooperation; working together through cheering one another to success.

Now that we are in the fall season, we want to remind parents that it is still hot outside. Water bottles are highly encouraged at PE. I just want to remind parents to please write your child's name in their jackets or sweaters. We find several of these items daily and if we can't find an owner we take it to lost and found. Great things are happening in dance this fall! The fourth and fifth-grade students have started learning the choreography for their grade level performance. Please save the date!!! The performance will be at the Lake Nona High School Performing Arts Center on Monday, December 9, 2019. The fourth-grade performance will begin at 5:30 pm and the fifth-grade performance will begin at 7:00 pm. We will send more details and a permission slip home with your student soon.

The second and third-grade students are reviewing the B.A.S.T.E. (body, action, space, time and energy) dance elements and how to identify, discuss and demonstrate movements using accurate dance terminology.


The kindergarten and first-grade students are exploring movement possibilities using imagery and imitation. The students are learning movement phrases and then experiencing how changes in tempo, level, and direction can alter the meaning or feeling of that movement.



In celebration of Hispanic Heritage month, all grade levels will be discussing the influence of Hispanic arts and culture. We will be learning about Latin social dances including salsa, mambo, merengue, and bachata. A reminder for all students and parents, please have your student dress for dance the same way your child dresses for P.E. Homework Tips: Here are some tips to guide the way:

- Set up a homework-friendly area. Make sure kids have a well-lit place to complete homework. Keep supplies paper, pencils, glue, scissors within reach.
- Schedule regular study time. Some kids work best in the afternoon, following a snack and play period; others may prefer to wait until after dinner.
- **Help them make a plan**. Encourage your child to break up the work into manageable chunks. Create a work schedule for the night if necessary and schedule in breaks.
- Keep distractions to a minimum. This means no TV, loud music, or phone calls. (Occasionally, though, a
 phone call to a classmate about an assignment can be helpful.)
- Make sure kids do their own work. They won't learn if they don't think for themselves and make their own
 mistakes. Parents can make suggestions and help with directions. But it's a kid's job to do the learning.
- Praise their work and efforts. Post an aced test or art project on the refrigerator. Mention academic
 achievements to relatives.





PARENTS - We Need Your Help

Car loop safety

We continue to ask for your cooperation as we work to keep our students safe during the afternoon pick up. Children who are designated walkers should be walking to their homes not to a car. If you are picking your child up in a car, you need to use the car loop as it was designed and pick your child up at the curb where it is safe. Adults and safety patrols are prepared to help while keeping the process efficient. On average, we can have all children safely picked up in under 25 minutes.

Parents, please do not park in our overflow parking lot and call your children to walk across the car loop to meet you. This is not safe and against our school policy. Be advised, should parents continue to do this, the overflow parking lot gate will be locked until the car loop has been cleared.

Choose Words Carefully

It is important to know Sun Blaze ES and OCPS take student safety and threats very seriously. Younger students in particular will sometimes use a poor choice of words. They may be playing a game of pretend or get angry with a friend and say things such as, "I'm gonna shoot you," or "I could just kill you." These words are unkind and are considered to be a threat toward another person. Please know that if your child makes a comment such as these, regardless of the context or intention, we will be addressing it with the child and you as a parent. Disciplinary action may occur in a variety of forms upon investigation. We are asking that you have a discussion with your child about words that are appropriate to use at school, how to properly express their feelings, and how to seek assistance from a teacher when needed. We appreciate your assistance with this.
